We increased our 'party' participation by almost 60% over last year. It was great to see friends and make new ones. We tossed some horseshoes and bocci balls around, too. To Keegan Young, our CMC Executive Director, thank you very much for breaking out of a busy climbing day and sharing time with us. Thank you Danielle, (our BPX Events Coordinator), and to her team for putting together a program enjoyed by all of us who attended. Smiles all around.





Congratulations to Linda Lawson and John Walters on their <u>BPX Explorer Awards</u> for completing the most trips this season, 7 and 5 respectively. (Linda and John were the main 'movers and shakers' who built the BPX Backpacking Section; they are still leading the *Pack!*). The <u>BPX Boots Awards</u> for the combined most

days spent and miles traveled went to Linda Lawson--72 miles and 21 days, and Kevin Galliers--66 miles and 9 days. Congratulations! We had gifts for all the leaders who led trips. Some cool door prizes were given away, too. Thanks to all who attended. For those who missed it, come next year!

With the close of our season, time to reflect on the good:

- 26 BPX Trip Leaders from the Denver, Pikes Peak, El Pueblo, Western Slope and Gore Range groups completed 51 backpacking trips for a total of 148 CMC backpacking days. That represents about a 100% increase in trips completed over the 2021 season.
- Of the 26 trip leaders, 12 led their first BPX Trip.
- We now have 57 Backpack Trip Leaders--a year-over-year increase of 52%.
- Over 200 CMC BPX members experienced some of the best wilderness areas Colorado has to offer. Almost a 200% increase in member participation over the prior season.
- Sponsored 2 gear check events at Chatfield Reservoir and Muller State Park.
- Our Social Media Team, Maggie Burns and Dinorah Osorio Lebron, grew our Facebook Group page from 0 members to over 600 and counting.
- Published 11 excellent monthly newsletters for our members.
- Sponsored a couple of Zoom clinics learning about the Colorado Trail Explorer (COTREX), the map app we use in building our annual CMC BPX Section Backpacking Trips Catalog.
- Participated in a joint venture trip with the CMC High Peaks Section.
- Sponsored a new members backpack trip.

We have challenges ahead of us:

- Increasing the number of BPX leaders leading trips, which in turn will increase the total number of trips offered. The demand is there. We have more capacity available, but can't deliver when only 50% of our BPX leaders lead a trip.
- Reducing our trip cancellations. We had 28 trips cancel in 2021.
- Addressing roster churn. Roster churn is not unique to the CMC Backpacking Section. It is a clubwide issue. A real bummer for the trip leaders who bust their tails to deliver great trips, only to have them cancel because everybody drops off. That must stop!

A huge thank you to the CMC state office and the Denver Group Council for their support, especially Sandy Heise, who is our Liaison from the Denver Group Council. A massively huge and humble thank you to the 26 trip leaders who led in 2021. Without you, all would be lost. To the BPX members we serve, thank you for being a part of a great CMC section. Your support and participation are what drives us in our attempt to deliver the best backpacking trips and programs available; exclusively to you.

I'd like to end with a personal thank you and shout-out to the excellent team serving on the BPX Committee: Steve Wolf, Vice-Chair and in charge of Trip Development; Louise Campbell-Blair, Treasurer; Mercedes Aponte, Secretary; Mike Holden, Membership Research & IT; Randy Blosser, Special Projects; Leila Murphy, Communications & Newsletter Editor; Maggie Burns and Dinorah Osorio Lebron, Social Media; and Danielle Piscatelli, Events. Working together, they delivered an awesome 2021 backpacking program.

We are working on building an even bigger and better 2022 CMC Backpacking Season. Our 2022 theme is MORE! More members, more leaders, and more trips. Stay tuned!

### The Trailhead

We finished September's discussion with the important but unpopular <u>Pre-Trip</u> call. When appropriate, use these calls as a means to establish a relationship as you discuss the route, technical equipment, or additional gear needed to prepare for unique weather or trail and parking conditions. This may allow you to explore questions of experience and skills. A team member's special skill in first aid, their past experience with the route, experience in area history or botanical uniqueness can all contribute to the other trip members' enjoyment.

Make sure you know of any team member's special concerns or requirements, such as medical conditions. People should volunteer this information since it is their safety that is at stake but typically do not unless given the opportunity or are asked directly. Trailhead introductions are frequently used for these questions but are not the best place to obtain what is often considered private information. Also, it is difficult to tell someone at the trailhead that the trip is not appropriate for them.

If you have spoken to each person that you don't know, then you might have a small bit of information you can share at the trailhead. Think of the impact if you introduce each person by calling their name and sharing something like "Jack likes to fish". Have Jack identify himself by raising his hand, and then have Jack share something.

Expect the unexpected. At the trailhead of a high-altitude snowshoe trip, I had a student sheepishly approach me to mention he had a "small heart attack" a few months earlier and hadn't been at altitude since, but wanted to participate to see if he could make it. Hmmm..... Or the student who collapsed behind me from a seizure and who didn't think it was important to tell me he had one a year ago. Yes, both had been asked and give the opportunity to tell me as their WTS instructor many weeks before these hikes. Expect the unexpected!
