"CLOSE ENCOUNTERS OF THE MOOSE KIND"

BPX GEAR TIP OF THE MONTH

Pack Liner or Pack Cover

Spending time in the backcountry, especially during Colorado's monsoon season, is almost a guarantee that you'll get wet. But it's important that you keep essential pieces of gear like your sleeping bag, camp clothes, and electronics dry. While there are waterproof backpacks (make sure the seams are sealed), most backpackers use either a pack liner or a pack cover. Here are some pros and cons when considering which one is right for you.

PACK LINER

For a liner you can use something as cheap as a compactor (not contractor) bag (2.5 oz), a Nylofume bag (0.9 oz), or one from Gossamer Gear (1.2 oz); backpack-specific liners like Peregrine (3 oz), or Sea To Summit (3.4 oz); or ultralight (and expensive) ones from Hyperlite Mountain Gear (2 oz) and Zpacks (1.8 oz).

Pros

- . More effective in keeping your gear dry from rain, wet grass, or falling into a stream.
- Lightweight
- Provides a divider to separate dry gear from wet or muddy items.

Cons

- Have to remember to put it in first when packing.
- Does not keep the outside of your pack dry, which can add several ounces of water weight until it dries out. Also will not keep the contents of your pack's outside pockets dry.

PACK COVER

Pros

- · Usually comes with the pack so not an additional cost.
- Keeps outside of your pack dry, including exterior pockets.
- Can protect your pack from mud and snagging on brush.

Cons

- Covers are going to leak. The pack's backpanel is a vulnerable place for rain to go down your back and seep into your pack. Your shoulder straps and hip belt will still get drenched too, and water dripping off the cover can soak your butt if you are not wearing rain pants.
- Does not protect your gear if you fall into a river.
- It's harder to grab your water bottle and things from your outside pockets.
- Can snag on bushes possibly dislodging it so it's no longer fully covering your pack.
- Must stop to put it on.
- Typically weigh more than a liner although the **Zpacks cover** only weighs 1.4 oz.
