

Alpine Scrambling Course (ASC)

Alpine scrambling is defined as unroped climbing over mountainous terrain. The Denver Group's Alpine Scrambling Course (ASC) consists of self-guided online learning, 3 online weekday evening lectures, one in-person meetup (weekday evening), a Student Skills Field Day (Snow Travel and Scrambling Skills), and 2 progressive Scramble Field Days.

There is strong emphasis on route-finding and teamwork throughout the course. ASC will require a significant time commitment over May and June. It's well worth it! This is a popular course that always fills up.

Wilderness Trekking School (WTS) Starts April 2

Wilderness Trekking School (WTS) is for all – whether you want to bag a few 14ers or just want to enjoy the scenery. Students are adults of all ages, and it's the CMC's most popular school. It's a comprehensive course on mountain day-hiking, with no prerequisites.

If you're new to hiking, WTS provides an opportunity to learn how to travel safely and confidently in the backcountry. If you're already an experienced hiker, it gives you a chance to review and enhance your skills and maybe fill in some gaps.

WTS is a requirement for the Backpacking School and Alpine Climbing School so, if you're interested in either or both of those, sign up for WTS today.

Learn and practice new skills, make new friends, and become a safer, more confident backcountry traveler!

Tuition is \$170 until March 25 for current CMC Members, and \$190 thereafter.

Wilderness Survival School (WSS)

This school is designed to provide the skills and self-confidence to increase your odds of survival in an unexpected stay in the wilderness. Topics covered include, but are not limited to, preventing a survival emergency, psychology/attitude, shelters, signaling, fire craft, and hypothermia. Survival-related medical emergencies and other priorities will also be covered. WSS includes three weeknight lectures and one overnight field lesson that provides practical training and experience in a simulated survival situation. This school is particularly informative to the novice/intermediate hiker, but even very experienced CMC members have found it valuable.

Enrollment is open to all CMC members (only) with ANY level of backcountry experience or hiking classification.

The overnight training is not a "sink-or-swim" field trip, and we will not be surviving off of roots, berries, wild mushrooms or killing and eating bugs/wildlife. The goal is to learn from a simulated survival situation and to practice skills with the equipment we should normally carry in our daypacks. There are no physical stamina requirements to attend the field session.

Dates for the 2024 course:

Lecture sessions: Mondays, May 6th, 13th, & 20th from 7 pm to no later than 9:30 pm at the American Mountaineering Center in a main floor conference room.

The overnight field session near Bailey, CO, is scheduled for June 1st & 2nd (all day Saturday, returning to town Sunday morning).

Tuition is \$84.00. A textbook and some supplies will be provided. **Enrollment will open in mid-March.** For more details and enrollment, please go **HERE**. When registration opens, a link to sign up will be provided there.

Octo Hike Series - A great success and more leaders are needed! By Linda Lawson

Fifteen hikes were completed from June through December 2023, of which four trips had a mileage range of 4 to 6 miles and 300' to 800' elevation gain compared to the current EASY classification of up to 8 miles and/or 1200' elevation gain. Seven hikes were 4 miles; five hikes were 5 miles, with the remaining hikes being 6 miles. Of the fifteen hikes, nine were in Douglas County or Jefferson County Open Space parks.

The Series increased safety precautions by having two leaders on each of 12 trips and three leaders on one trip; on only two trips was there a single leader.

120 participants enjoyed the Octogenarian Hike series, whether they were in their 70s, 80s, or younger ages. Repeat hikers were not tallied due to the absence of accessible data.

Octo Hikes limit the group size, including leaders and assistants, to 10. On only one occasion was this practice not followed; however, there were two leaders on that trip and participants were separated into two groups.

A total of seven leaders participated in the season with two leaders leading or co-leading the majority of the trips and five leaders leading one or two trips.
