Lightning Safety Tips for Hiking in Colorado




Nearly one hundred people are killed each year from lightning strikes. So, how do you stay safe during a storm that produces ground to cloud electricity? The following lightning safety tips provide guidance on how to minimize risk during a severe, lightning-filled storm:

- Recognize that electricity is in the air. Even if clouds have yet to produce lightning, electricity may still be in the air. The best method of detecting danger is to closely observe your or your hiking partner's hair. If you see that hair is beginning to raise into the air, you know it is time you high-tail it out of the area you're in and seek shelter.
- Always follow the "30/30 Rule." Upon first sight of lightning, count the seconds that pass until you hear thunder. If the number of seconds is 30 or less, seek shelter immediately. Stay put for 30 minutes after the last lightning flash or rumble of thunder. The National Weather Service estimates that 50% of all lightning deaths are sustained after the storm has passed.
- Avoid dangerous locations. Stay near shelter during a storm; avoid terrain above timberline and bodies of water. If lightning moves in, try to avoid being within 100 yards of any body of water. Thunderstorms in Colorado have a propensity to build up steam between 12:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. Realistically, if thunderstorms are in the forecast, you should never be above timberline after 1:00 p.m. If you are above tree line when a storm rolls in, rapidly descend to shelter. Avoid caves they actually channel electricity fairly well and are extremely dangerous to be in during a storm.
- Avoid isolated trees and high points. It is always better to seek shelter in a thick forest versus an isolated stand of trees. Lightning favors small groupings of trees over dense stands.
- Choose your camp wisely. Do not pitch your tent next to the tallest trees in the area. Lightning-filled storms can
 develop during the middle of the evening. Once again, it is best to locate camp in a thick stand of trees instead of
 next to an isolated grouping.
- **Discard metal objects.** Drop all metal objects during a storm. Such objects might include an internal or external frame backpack, trekking poles, etc. Furthermore, you should get off a bicycle if you are mountain biking or road biking and a storm is closing in.
- **Avoid open fields.** However, if you are stuck in an open field and cannot find shelter, find the lowest possible area. Crouch with your head low and keep your feet together. Never sit or lie down on the ground. Both of these positions facilitate greater ground-body contact, which gives lightning a wider space to travel through.
- **Spread out.** If lightning is imminent and you are in a group, try to spread out. This will minimize the chance everyone in the group will be struck. It is important to ensure at least one person will be able to respond to an emergency situation.
- Remain calm if someone is struck. If somebody is hit by lightning, provide the proper first aid. If the victim is not breathing, provide mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. However, if the person no longer has a pulse, the responder should attempt to provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Someone from the group should stay with the victim until help arrives.

New Open Space – Castle Rock

Castle Rock is adding 681 acres of open space with the purchase of Lost Canyon Ranch. Preserving this property was critical as it is one of the last undeveloped large-acre properties near the town. Douglas County, GOCO, Douglas Land Conservancy and the Conservation Fund all contributed to the \$15 million open space. The ranch shares a boundary with Castlewood Canyon State Park and will provide critical habitat for wildlife. The town will invite the public to participate in a planning process to guide future public access to the open space.

Upcoming Pikes Peak Group Classes

ARC Pro Basic Anchors Sat, Jun 22, 2024

We will spend a full field day outside reviewing anchor gear, general anchoring principles, and methods of rigging climbing anchors. At the end of the class students should be able to safely rig a top rope climbing anchor using various materials. Prerequisite: BMS Rock or equivalent, to include basic belaying and rappelling skills. Cost: \$45 for PPG members, \$65 for all others.

ARC Pro Multipitch Concepts

Sat, Jul 20, 2024 - Sun, Jul 21, 2024

This class will consist of two field days with the first day spent on low angle terrain learning and practicing multipitch belaying, transitions, rappelling and lowering; followed by a day of multipitch practice on a moderate trad climb. Prerequisite: BMS Rock Climbing or the equivalent at a minimum. Leading skills are not necessary, but it is recommended that participants take the ARC Pro Trad Gear and Anchors and Traditional Lead Climbing classes prior to this class, as students may practice placing trad gear and building trad anchors in this class. However, this class will be beneficial to anyone looking to climb multipitch routes—to include leaders and followers. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.

PPG WTS - Intro to Backpacking

Mon, Jul 29, 2024 - Mon, Aug 5, 2024

Backpacking is another way to experience the outdoors by carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat and sleep in pursuit of your adventure. It can take you to a distant location from the trailhead, help you enjoy an activity (summit attempt, alpine lake fishing, etc.) or serve as the main goal itself, such as hiking a long trail like the Colorado Trail. Carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat, sleep, stay dry, treat injuries, stay found, cook food, treat water, and enjoy yourself may be intimidating - but taken one step at a time - is very manageable. This class focuses on the basics in a lecture/discussion format and concludes with an overnight backpacking trip to put our new knowledge into action. Safety and fun are key elements of this class. Cost: \$35 for PPG members, \$70 for all others.

ARC Pro Sport Lead Climbing

Sat, Aug 24, 2024 - Sun, Aug 25, 2024

This class will teach participants the skills needed to safely lead sport climbs on their own, including basic leading technique, setting up a top-rope anchor, cleaning the anchor and rapping or lowering down, advanced lead belaying, bailing off a route, climbing movement, and falling practice. It is taught over 2 full field days at a climbing crag. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.

PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals

Mon, Sep 16, 2024 - Sat, Sep 21, 2024

The Wilderness Fundamentals class is an introduction of important skills and back country knowledge to enable participants to independently plan and safely implement a day's outing in the great outdoors—away from civilization and all it provides. This class is a pre-requisite for many of our other PPG courses and will provide participants with a copy of *Mountaineering: Freedom of the Hills* that will be referenced in other courses! Make sure you have a good foundation of the basics before expanding your outdoor skillset. Cost: \$45 for PPG members, \$90 for all others.

PPG WTS - Land Navigation

Wed, Oct 9, 2024 - Sat, Oct 19, 2024

The PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals Course is the prerequisite for this course. Students must have earned the "Wilderness Trekking School Student" badge to be able to register for this course. This course is the second course in the Pikes Peak Group's Wilderness Trekking School (WTS) curriculum. This course may also be a prerequisite for trips or other schools. Cost: \$30 for PPG members, \$60 for all others.




