Conservation Corner

The Wilderness Act of 1964

September 3rd marks the 60th anniversary of the Wilderness Act of 1964, established when President Lyndon Johnson signed the Act into law. The passage of the Act resulted in 54 wilderness areas in 13 states becoming legally designated wilderness that year. At the center of this piece of legislation is a working definition of wilderness: "wilderness, in contrast with those areas where man and his own works dominate the landscape, is hereby recognized as an area where the earth and its community of life are untrammeled by man, where man himself is a visitor who does not remain."

The Act has been criticized because of its failure to recognize indigenous history. Indigenous people have inhabited and cared for these lands for ages. University of Illinois Professor Rosalyn LaPier, a member of the Blackfeet Nation notes that the issue is not the concept of wilderness. Indigenous people have historically been stewards of the land, setting aside places because they are sacred, or because a certain plant or animal species thrives in a specific place. In other words, these places were not unmanaged by man. Recently, both the National Park Service and the US Forest Service have recognized indigenous history and consulted with tribes on management issues.

Even without a legislatively created definition, the idea of wilderness brings to mind images of remote and wild landscapes, as well as personal experiences in far flung places. Terry Tempest Williams, writer and environmentalist from Utah, touched on the implication that humans are not merely visitors to nature when she stated: "wilderness reminds us of what it means to be human, what we are connected to rather than what we are separate from." Today, there are more than 800 wilderness areas in 44 states. In her book "Red" Ms. Williams advocates for the continued use of the Act as a tool for preservation stating, "[i]n an ideal world ... we may not need to 'designate' wilderness, so evolved will be our collective land ethic We will not have to 'preserve' or 'protect' land because we will have learned what it means to be 'good stewards,' to see the larger community as an embrace of all species."

Big Game Habitat Update



In February of 2024, the CMC Western Slope group submitted a comment to the BLM regarding a proposed plan for the management of big game habitat on over 8.3 million acres of land in the state of Colorado. We supported a management plan that would protect against habitat loss, protect migration corridors, and limit oil and gas development that negatively impacts big game habitat. The BLM listened to the concerns raised by individuals and citizen groups, as well as Colorado Parks and Wildlife biologists about declining populations of these animals. It recently released a plan to protect migration corridors and high priority big game habitat, as well as providing limits to energy development for the benefit of species like elk, mule deer, pronghorn and bighorn sheep. Mesa and Montrose Counties' NCA Proposal for the Dolores River

On July 24, 2024, Mesa and Montrose counties published a proposed National Conservation Area (NCA) to conserve 29,806 acres of public lands in the Dolores River Canyon Country, focusing on the river corridor. In contrast, the national monument proposal is advocating for the protection of almost 400,000 acres. While this is a first step, many citizen groups feel the proposal falls short for many reasons. Craig Grother, Central West Slope Regional Director of Colorado Backcountry Hunters and Anglers stated that the NCA proposal fails to conserve wildlands that are essential wildlife and fish habitats. The Dolores River Boating Advocates called the draft "grossly inadequate" for omitting vast portions of the river canyon landscape. Mesa County is accepting comments on the counties' proposal here.
